## FIRST READING

Isaiah 5:1-7

<sup>1</sup>Let me sing for my beloved my love song concerning his vineyard: My beloved had a vineyard on a very fertile hill. <sup>2</sup>He dug it and cleared it of stones, and planted it with choice vines; he built a watchtower in the midst of it, and hewed out a wine vat in it; and he looked for it to yield grapes, but it yielded wild grapes. <sup>3</sup>And now, O inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, judge between me and my vineyard. <sup>4</sup>What more was there to do for my vineyard, that I have not done in it? When I looked for it to yield grapes, why did it yield wild grapes? <sup>5</sup>And now I will tell you

what I will do to my vineyard. I will remove its hedge, and it shall be devoured; I will break down its wall, and it shall be trampled down. <sup>6</sup>I will make it a waste; it shall not be pruned or hoed, and briers and thorns shall grow up; I will also command the clouds that they rain no rain upon it. <sup>7</sup>For the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the house of Israel, and the men of Judah are his pleasant planting; and he looked for justice, but behold, bloodshed; for righteousness, but behold, an outcry!

<sup>7</sup>Restore us, O God of hosts; show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

<sup>8</sup>You have brought a vine out of Egypt; you cast out the nations and planted it.

<sup>9</sup>You prepared the ground for it; it took root and filled the land.

<sup>10</sup>The mountains were covered by its shadow and the towering cedar trees by its boughs.

<sup>11</sup>You stretched out its tendrils to the sea and its branches to the river.

<sup>12</sup>Why have you broken down its wall, so that all who pass by pluck off its grapes?

<sup>13</sup>The wild boar of the forest has ravaged it, and the beasts of the field have grazed upon it.

<sup>14</sup>Turn now, O God of hosts, look down from heaven; behold and tend this vine; preserve what your right hand has planted.

<sup>15</sup>They burn it with fire like rubbish; at the rebuke of your countenance let them perish.

<sup>16</sup>Let your hand be upon the man of your right hand, the son of man you have made so strong for yourself.

<sup>17</sup>And so will we never turn away from you; give us life, that we may call upon your Name.

<sup>18</sup>Restore us, O Lord God of hosts; show the light of your countenance, and we shall be saved.

## SECOND READING

Philippians 3:4b-14

<sup>4b</sup>If anyone else thinks he has reason for confidence in the flesh, I have more: 5circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; <sup>6</sup>as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. <sup>7</sup>But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. <sup>8</sup>Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ 9 and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith — <sup>10</sup>that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, <sup>11</sup>that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead. <sup>12</sup>Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect, but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. <sup>13</sup>Brothers, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, <sup>14</sup>I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

Matthew 21:33-46

P The Holy Gospel according to Matthew, the 21<sup>st</sup> chapter.

C Glory to you, O Lord. (sung)

<sup>33</sup>{Jesus said to the chief priests and the Pharisees,} "Hear another parable. There was a master of a house who planted a vineyard and put a fence around it and dug a winepress in it and built a tower and leased it to tenants, and went into another country. <sup>34</sup>When the season for fruit drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants to get his fruit. <sup>35</sup>And the tenants took his servants and beat one, killed another, and stoned another.

<sup>36</sup>Again he sent other servants, more than the first. And they did the same to them. <sup>37</sup>Finally he sent his son to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' 38But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir. Come, let us kill him and have his inheritance.' <sup>39</sup>And they took him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. 40When therefore the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" <sup>41</sup>They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death and let out the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the fruits in their seasons." 42Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the Scriptures: "The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes'? <sup>43</sup>Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people producing its fruits. <sup>44</sup>And the one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and when it falls on anyone, it will crush him." <sup>45</sup>When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they perceived that he was speaking about them. 46And although they were seeking to arrest him, they feared the crowds, because they held him to be a prophet.



# Reformation 500 Moments with Martin Luther

It would be very proper to place in the coat-of-arms of every pious prince a loaf of bread instead of a lion... or to stamp it upon the coin, to remind both them and their subjects that by their office we have protection and peace, and that without them we could not eat and retain our daily bread. (Large Catechism)

Martin Luther had a heart for the poor and in need. As a young

monk he, along with his Augustinian brothers, had to beg for coins in order to eat. He knew what it was like to be hungry. In a letter to his dear friend George Spalatin, who was a priest and colleague at the University of Wittenberg, Luther wrote concerning a poor fisherman. At the time of the letter, June 7, 1522, George was the private secretary and court chaplain to Elector Frederick the Wise and thus had the ruler's ear.

Luther wrote, "A poor fisherman made a mistake and on only one occasion fished too close to the waters of my Most Gracious Lord (Elector Frederick). I interceded in his behalf with the tax collector, and I am now informed that he transferred responsibility to my Most Gracious Lord. I beg you, therefore, to intercede in my name with my Most Gracious Lord, in order that the penalty be changed. I understand that a fine of six hundred pieces of silver has been imposed on him. I do not ask that he go unpunished; his case should serve as an example to inspire respect and to demonstrate that there is a government. But I ask that his punishment should not deprive him of his living." (LW 49, p.9)





# Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost, Proper 22 (Year A)

When it comes to righteousness, Paul says, "I win the medal!" When it comes to following the law to the letter, again he says, "I get the prize!"
