P The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

L When the days drew near for him to be taken up, Jesus set his face to go to Jerusalem to die on the cross for us.

C So we set our faces to the cross of Christ this day, and not on the treasures of the world.

L Jesus said, “Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal

C but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do no break in and steal

The Season of Lent • Year C



The general tone for worship during Lent should be reflective without being somber. Simplicity in liturgical elements and hymnody is conducive to setting the appropriate tone. As part of the reflective nature of this season, there is an emphasis on repentance. In the early church, Lent was the period when new believers experienced the catechumenate in preparation for the Sacrament of Holy Baptism. In this season, we are not only reminded of Jesus' faithful and intentional journey to the cross, but also of his calling for us to "take up the cross" and follow him.
